

 Location: The ASA will be registered as an NGO in the Philippines.

- Membership Fees: Membership dues will be charged by the calendar year and there will be no dues for 2013. A flat \$20 USD membership fee will be charged for 2014-2015, to be collected with the conference registration fee.
- 3. Conference: The ASA will hold biannual conferences in Asian locations.

Shakespearean Journeys: The Inaugural ASA Conference Taipei, 15–17 May 2014

Overview:

By land or sea, across city and country, journeys comprise an important motif in Shakespeare's works, be they smooth or perilous, round trip or to an undiscovered country from whose bourne no travelers return. The journeys undertaken can be physical, emotional, spiritual, or a combination. Though not in person, Shakespeare also journeys extensively, crossing not only time and space but also language, culture, and media. A most versatile and protean voyager, Shakespeare sometimes travels light and does as the locals do, yet sometimes carries heavy baggage and remains a stranger in a foreign land.

"Shakespearean Journeys" aims to explore all aspects of this theme. Topics include, but are not limited to:

- ◆ Travel and relocation in early modern Europe
- ◆ Shakespearean travelers, exiles, shipwrecks
- ◆ Geographic discovery and the New World
- ◆ Emotional or spiritual journeys
- Foreign Shakespeare: translation, adaptation, and teaching
- ◆ Transnational, cross-cultural, interdisciplinary, or intergeneric theory or practice

- ◆ Seminar: please submit a 250-word description of the seminar, plus a short bio including a summary of your previous seminar experience.

All conference participants must be registered members of the ASA and must remit the conference registration fee. If you wish to apply for a need-based fee waiver or a travel grant, please add a paragraph of explanation.

Report from the Shakespeare Society of India

A three-day International Seminar on "Revisiting Shakespeare in Indian Literature and Culture" held on 7-9 March 2013, and organized by Indraprastha College for Women, the University of Delhi and the Shakespeare Society of India, proved that interest in "other" Shakespeares is burgeoning.

The seminar had 35 presentations, with 4 parallel sessions. Participants from all parts of the country, and from the UK and the USA, engaged with diverse aspects of the relationship between Shakespeare and India. Papers on old and new translations/adaptations in Indian languages, performances/film versions, their cultural and political contexts, the relation of Shakespeare with Indian writers, Indian philosophy, early Indian and modern stage, the intercultural and globalised Shakespeare—many such issues

and perspectives were explored. One of the highlights, led by the plenary speaker Claire Cochrane (U. of Worcester, UK), was the session on "local" and "global" Indian Shakespeares where this relationship was revisited in the context of Indian heritage in postcolonial Britain and as seen in the World Shakespeare Festivals at the Globe Theatre and at the RSC. Another particularly successful session was the Director's Panel which discussed the challenges of performing Shakespeare in India today.

College students entertained everyone with Homlette and Lear's Daughters and the BBC Arts Documentary Felicity Kendal's Indian Shakespeare Quest was screened.






